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TOM SUTTON

(1906-1990)

Thomas Emmitt Sutton was born April 11, 1906 and was married to Irene (Doll) Carter Sept. 18, 1927. To this union five sons and one daughter were born. Tom Sutton obeyed the gospel and endeavored to serve God for the most part of his adult life. He made mistakes, but he feared God, loved the truth, his family and his brethren. He especially appreciated preachers who would **preach the word uncompromisingly**. He wanted the truth taught "like it is."

Reading, studying and discussing God's Word was an enjoyable part of Tom Sutton's life, esp. the last 25 to 30 years. His life touched and influenced the lives of many. He and Mom had their 63rd wedding anniversary a few days before his death on Oct. 11, 1990, at the age of 84 years. He is survived by his wife, five sons, 18 grand-children, 27 great grandchildren, one sister and a host of brethren in Christ and friends.

Services were conducted at Spry Funeral Chapel in Athens, AL on Oct. 13, 1990. Hiram Hutto and Dick Ward spoke and Bob Mitchell directed congregational singing. Alvin Holt spoke at the cemetery. The body was laid to rest in the Limestone Cemetery (about a mile from his home) to await the resurrection and judgment.

Dad is gone from us. We miss him. We sorrow, but with hope. He taught us many good lessons by word and by example. We have many precious memories. May God bless and comfort Mom and all who grieve. 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Editorial . . .

AN ELDER'S CHILDREN IN TITUS 1:6 — SINGULAR OR PLURAL? (No. 2)

In our previous study it was pointed out that one of the qualifications of a bishop (elder) is "... Having faithful CHILDREN not accused of riot or unruly" (Titus 1:6). First Tim. 5:4 says: "One that ruleth well his own house, having his CHILDREN in subjection with all gravity."

The term CHILDREN is a translation of the Greek word TEKNA and both TEKNA and CHILDREN are plural in form. It was also shown that a word that is plural in number indicates more than one. We stated and illustrated that we should adopt the primary, ordinary meaning of words (rather than secondary, abnormal meanings) unless it is forbidden by the context or by some other Scriptural statement or principle. Since the primary, ordinary meaning of CHILD-REN is more than one and this primary meaning is not forbidden either by the context or some other Scriptural statement or principle, we have no right to adopt a secondary. abnormal meaning such as "class" or "categorical" usage. To arbitrarily place a secondary, abnormal meaning on CHILDREN (such as "plural of class" and thus means one or more) is without justification either grammatically Scripturally. or

CHILDREN in these verses obviously mean CHILDREN! Since CHILDREN is plural, "more than one is meant."

QUESTIONS AND OBJECTIONS CONSIDERD

Let us now consider some questions that are asked and objections that are raised in an effort to justify men being elders who have only one child each.

1. "Is the Greek word translated CHILDREN in 1 Tim. 3:4 and Titus 1:6 singular or plural in form?"

REPLY:

A. The Greek word TEKNA is the word translated CHILDREN and it is **plural** in form.

B. TEKNA is the plural form of TEKNON which is singular.

2. "Does the Greek word TEKNA mean "child or children" as some have supposed?"

REPLY: NO, it does not mean "child or children." TEKNA means "children." Incidentally, that is why the translators translated it "children." Note: It is sometimes translated "sons."

3. "These passages do **not** say **how many** children an elder must have. Therefore, we have no right to say **how many**?"

REPLY:

A. It is true that these passages do not say specifically as to how many children an elder must have, but they do say "children" which is plural in form. Words that are plural in number indicate more than one. So, we conclude that an elder must have at least two children. He may have more. We cannot bind the exact number.

B. The scriptures do not say how many elders a church must have. Therefore, we have no right to say how many. Does this fact prove that it is right for a church to have only one elder? No! Since "elders" is plural in number in Acts 14:23; 20:17 and 1 Peter 5:1-4 we conclude that "more than one" is meant.

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4. "The plural (children) includes the singular (child). Therefore, an elder with one child has children."

REPLY:

A. Since plural words include the singular it is true that "children" includes a singular "child." But since it is plural it also includes "more than one" (child).

B. The plural "churches" in "The churches of Christ salute you" in Rom. 16:16 includes the singular (church of Christ). However, there is no way that the expression in Rom. 16:16 can mean "only one" church of Christ.

C. The plural "elders" in Acts 14:23; 20:17 and 1 Peter 5:1-4 includes the singular (one elder). But that does not prove that a church with "only one elder" has "elders."

5. "Genesis 21:7 says: And she (Sarah-CRS) said, Who would have said unto Abraham, that Sarah should have given children suck? for I have born him a son in his old age." Sarah bore one son named Isaac, but in the text just quoted she referred to him as "children." Hence the English word children is used here to denote the singular number. Therefore, children in Titus 1:6 means one

REPLY:

A. For the sake of argument let us grant that the **plural** word **children** is used here in Gen. 21:7 to denote the **singular** number. This does **not** prove that **children** in 1 Tim. 3:4 and Titus 1:6 denotes the **singular** number.

child as well as more than one."

B. If **children** here denotes **only one child** it is because of **context** and thus is a **secondary**, abnormal application of **children**. It is **not** the **primary** meaning of **children**. So, the use here of **children** would **not** determine the meaning and use of **children** in Titus 1:6.

C. Personally, I am **not** convinced that **children** (plural) has a singular application in Gen. 21:7. This verse says Sarah bore "a **son**." Simple, isn't it? One son! **Not children** which would be **more than one**, but **one** son!

D. Why may have some said, "That Sarah should have given CHILDREN suck? Because she bore children? Not necessarily. Why then? Because Sarah bore a son. Note: The fact that Sarah bore a son was proof that she could give children suck. She was now able to suckle children. She could suckle children although she might not have done so.

E. Even if "children" in Gen. 21:7 is "class" or "categorical" usage, this does not prove that "children" in 1 Tim. 3:6 and Titus 1:6 or "elders in Acts 14:23 is so used to denote singular application.

6. "In Matthew 22:24 the Sadducees (referring to Dt. 25:5-6) said: '... Moses said, If a man die, having no children, his brother shall marry his wife, and raise up seed unto his brother.' Question: If the brother left one child would his brothers be obligated to marry his wife? Obviously, no. Then 'having no children' means the same as 'have no child' (as Dt. 22:5 says). Therefore, 'children' means 'child'."

REPLY:

A. If the above argument is true, then "children" is not used in its primary sense of a plural number, but in a secondary sense of "class" or "categorical" usage. It would then have a singular application.

B. However, this "fact" would **not** prove that "children" in Titus 1:6 and 1 Tim. 3:4 and "elders" in Acts 14:23 are "plurals of class" and thus are singular in application.

C. However, it may not be proven that "children" in Mt. 22:24 is used by inspiration to denote the singular (child). The singular (child) is found in Dt. 22:5 and not the plural

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(children). The Sadducees said "Having no CHILDREN" (and Matthew by inspiration recorded what they said), but Dt. 22:5 says "Have no CHILD." So if a brother left one child then there would be no need for his brother to marry his widow.

D. It is true that the expressions, "No child" and "No children" basically mean the same thing although "child" and "children" do not mean the same thing. "No child" means "Not one child." "No children" means "Not any children; no one (child) of more than two children." So the end result is that both expressions allow for not one child. But this does not prove that "children" means "child."
